# LOGISTICS

- 1. As from 2 June, you will be writing exams up to and including 19 June.
- 2. If you are writing, ensure that you are at school by 7h30.
- 3. After line-up, go immediately to your scheduled venue. The session will end at 11h00. Teachers will be available from 11h00 to 12h00 to assist any learner with content queries.
- 4. You may leave immediately after the session. The front gate will close at 12h00.
- 5. If you are still at school by 12h00, you must go to the hall for **<u>STUDY</u>**. Study ends at 14h00.
- 6. If you are still at school by 14h00, you must go to the Visagie Street entrance and wait for your transport there.
- 7. On days that no exam has been scheduled for a specific subject, learners may stay at home. However, if that learner wishes to study at school, the Boardroom is available.
- 8. Gr 9 exam venues (73 / 74 / 78 / 82 / 83): you will be in the same venue and at the same desk for the duration of the exams. A seating plan will be posted on each door's venue two days before exams start.
- 9. Once exams are done, you will have class in various subjects (a new roster will be given to you). Class starts on 20 June and will end 27 June. Your venues will be as follows:

9M in venue 17 (Mrs Matebesi's classroom) 9T in venue 31 (Mrs G Parker's classroom) 9V in venue 13 (Mrs de Bruin's classroom)


# **EXAM RULES**

- You must use your own stationery (2 blue pens, 2 HB pencils, eraser, sharpener, stapler, staples and ruler). No bags or pencil cases are allowed. You may use a transparent bag.
- Make sure you have all you need for the subject you are writing e.g. calculator, protractor, etc.
- 3) No tip-ex is allowed.
- 4) Once in the exam venue:
  - You may not talk.
  - You may not eat or drink.
  - You may not walk around.
  - You may not go to the toilet once the session has started.
  - Just before the session starts, you must put your belongings in the front of the class.
  - Random learners will be checked for anything that might deem irregular.
  - If you feel more comfortable, you may wear your tracksuit.
  - Phones must be switched off and in your bag.
  - Wrist watches must be placed in your bag.
- 5) If you cheat:
  - invigilator must write "cheating" on current answer sheet and take it away.
  - invigilator must issue a new answer booklet or clean writing paper for you to start over.
  - you will not be given extra time to complete exam.
  - The vice-principal or principal will be notified immediately after the session ends.
  - further disciplinary measures will take place.

6 Ask your teacher to clear any uncertainties you have before the exam.


7 Sleep well the night before the exam and get a full eight hours.
