Sister Shirley Kay IBVM

Loreto Sister Shirley Kay died peacefully on 17 October 2014 after a short illness at the age of 95.

She was born in Pretoria on 1 July 1919, the seventh child in a family of 13. When Shirley was a baby, the family moved to White River where her father bought a farm, and called it "Avalon".

In those early days there was no church in White River and one of the missionary priests came on horseback to the farm about once a month. The children were taught catechism and prepared for the sacraments in the family. Shirley went as a boarder to Loreto Convent in Lydenburg.

When Shirley was 21 she entered the novitiate at Loreto Convent Pretoria. One of her elder sisters, Patricia, entered the Notre Dame Sisters. Both of them had great love and knowledge of history.

Shirley majored in History and English and taught in Pretoria for many years, as well as in Sea Point and Glen Cowie. When she retired from teaching, she did sterling work organising the Loreto archives in Pretoria. Sister Shirley was also instrumental in initiating the Past Pupils Association.

Her grandmother went to school in Loreto Abbey, Dublin, and her mother was among the first pupils in Loreto Convent Skinner Street, so Sister Shirley's family had a long association with Loreto.

Sister Shirley decided to end her days in an Irish community and was assigned to Balbriggan in Fingal, Ireland, where she was lovingly cared for.

The Loreto Sisters in South Africa have many happy memories and recall the laughs she gave them when she entertained them with stories of her childhood and life on the farm.

Many teachers, parents and past pupils remember her with love and appreciation.

May God give her a rich reward for her consecration and ministry she did for love of him all her life.

REACHING OUT

After Matriculating at Hillcrest in 1974 I went on to study teaching at JCE. After getting married we moved to Port Elizabeth, Durban and then back to Jo'burg. Because of my very good convent upbringing, I had to be involved in my Church. So like a good Catholic girl I began teaching Catechism. I wanted to teach my own children and instil in them a love for the Sacraments,

especially Reconciliation and Holy Communion. So my journey at St John's, North Riding, began.

In 1991 my Mother passed away and this wonderful community reached out to me, supporting me and my family in love, bringing us meals and comforting us. I knew I wanted to do the same for others. That same year a "Care Group" was formed. We decided to become more involved with the sick, elderly and new mothers in our parish. We based ourselves on Matthew 25:40, "Whenever you did this for one of the least important of these brothers of mine, you did it for me". The original list of members was 23, but today the numbers have grown to over a hundred.

The Care Group outreach programmes are financed through donations and various fund-raising activities, like jumble sales and selling of crafts during the year and selling muffins after Mass on Sundays. We strongly believe that nothing can prosper without prayer that is why we dedicate this ministry to our Lord.

The CARE GROUP ministries include: **Funeral teas** which are done on a donation basis where eats, tea and coffee are provided at funerals. The **Sewing Group** sews track suits, knits beanies, blankets, etc for charity. We knit teddies for Choc as well. We make robes, altar linen, banners and whatever else is needed in the parish. **Flowers** are delivered to bereaved, ill, or "new birth" parishioners, just to let them know we care. **Hospital visits** are done every week, visiting Catholic patients in the two hospitals in our area. **Prayer Chain** - Anyone in need of prayer can ask for prayers and the chain is activated. **Home visits** are made after a bereavement or by request. **Kingsway School** -The ladies meet twice a week to make up 30 loaves of fish "sarmies" for this under-privileged school. **Meals** are prepared for whenever they are needed. We have a "cook in" on a voluntary basis at the church and keep prepared meals in our freezers. **Seniors Masses** are celebrated once a month. Care Group ladies fetch those who cannot get to church on their own from old age homes and private homes. During that Mass they are anointed with the oil of the sick. Afterwards, they are invited to a tea served in the hall by the ladies. We are always around to assist our parish priest. It is a lovely ministry to be part of. I was Chairlady from 1996-2000.

This group gives, gives and gives of themselves. So twice a year I organise a day of reflection/retreat for them where they can spend the day in prayer and reconnect with Our Lord. Sr Emer has directed us in two of these days of recollection.

It is a great privilege to serve others and, through that, serve my God.

As far as our cruise, that was No. 1 on our bucket list, is concerned, it was one of the best things that we have managed to do in our 57 years of marriage.

We flew from Johannesburg to Cape Town, where we were met and taken to the Good Hope convention centre for registrations. This was very well organised. Our credit cards were scanned and we were given a card to use on the ocean liner (we were told that the Queen Mary 2 was not a ship but an ocean liner). A coloured sticker was placed on our shoulders and we were then called by colour to board a bus to the docks. Our baggage had been taken from us at arrival at the convention centre and we were told it would be outside our cabins. We were treated to a wonderful luncheon and then shown to our staterooms (not cabins). What a wonderful surprise to enter a stateroom of that size with a balcony that had glass only half way up. A lovely table and two reclining chairs on the balcony. Two beds, one with a special cover for us to put our luggage on and unpack. An ice bucket with a bottle of champagne and a welcome message. A message to tell what time we would

have dinner and a newspaper with all the activities for that evening and the following day. This paper was delivered to our stateroom every evening when the beds were turned down and the chocolate placed on the pillow.

There was just so much to do every single day, from art classes, to fruit carving lessons, to talks by international speakers, to movies, to the planetarium experiences, to entertainment in the theatre by international entertainers every single night. Bingo, crossword, string quartets playing in the afternoon during high tea in the Queens room, ballroom dancing lessons, bridge lessons and tournaments, pianists and trumpeters playing in the various lounges. We did as much as we wanted to do and enjoyed the bridge tournaments every afternoon and even came 1st once and 2nd twice. The talent in the theatre was absolutely exceptional.

Our dining room was the Britannica room. We sat with the same people at dinner and were able to sit wherever we liked for breakfast and lunch. That was great as we came into contact with a lot of British people, also Australians, Germans, etc. The liner goes around the world and takes 117 days. We met a couple from England who were doing that for the 3rd time!! Oh how wonderful to have the money to do that. Many of the passengers were going on to visit relatives in Australia and getting off in Melbourne or Sydney. Our budget sadly only took us as far as Perth but we had the most wonderful 15 days of utter pleasure on the Cunard Flagliner, the QUEEN MARY 2. The food and service was absolute top class. There was not a single thing that we could find fault with.

3 days out to sea sadly one of the male passengers died of a heart attack. The QM2 had a mortuary as well as a team of doctors and we were due to dock in Mauritius in 2 days. The son of the deceased was able to fly from Australia to Mauritius and fetch the body and his mother. Fortunately that was the only sadness on the whole cruise.

We went ashore at Mauritius and were able to find a few things to buy for our little ones. After that it was just sea days and that was exactly what we wanted. With all the entertainment on board we just enjoyed every minute and even had tea on our balcony. With a lift of the phone one could order whatever you wanted. Absolute bliss. I could go on and on and on. We disembarked in Fremantle which is the port of Perth. Fremantle is a charming little place. We were then taken to a hotel that we were booked into in Perth. We were able to do the hop on-hop off bus there and see a lot of Perth. The next evening we flew back to South Africa and landed at 4.30am. A kind niece and nephew were there to pick us up and we drove into Pretoria to be greeted by the most beautiful sunrise we had ever seen. What a welcome home that was.

PILGRIMAGE OR TOURIST.... OR MAYBE A BIT OF BOTH!

My very first pilgrimage was to Egypt and the Holy Land in 1999. The group met at least four times prior to departure giving everyone a chance to meet and pray together. Some of the group opted to include a visit to Egypt before going to the Holy Land. Egypt, the land of Pharaohs, pyramids, Moses, and the refuge of the Holy Family after the Flight! There was great excitement to visit The Necropolis and many of the touristy bits. A trip by water taxi to old Cairo was an eye opener ... we could have been right back in Biblical times.

Not everything goes according to plan! After reaching the summit of Mt. Sinai, having started the climb at midnight, marvelling at the magnificent sunrise, we descended (some of us by camel ... ouch!) only to find that the bus had left on another trip and we were stranded outside the Monastery of St Catherine. Some quick thinking on the part of our guides and a hasty collection from all of us enabled us to travel to the Israeli border in Kombi Taxis. What a nightmare ... would rather have been in Joburg in a local one!

The Holy Land was all I had expected it to be. My personal highlight was the boat ride on the Sea of Galilee. Perhaps, because nothing could have changed on the lake, and I could well imagine Jesus on the shore signalling to his disciples. Calvary, the Via Dolorosa, Bethlehem, Jericho and Caesarea ... all brought Scripture so close to me ... found myself referring to the Good Book all the time. We visited the Great Synagogue in Jerusalem on Yom Kippur, knowing that this is what Jesus would have done and then paid our respects to the victims of the Holocaust at Yad Vashem.

One makes friends on a trip like this, especially as this group was privileged to have a priest with them who said Holy Mass in the most unlikely places ... like on the perimeter of the Great Pyramid, or on the Israeli/Egyptian beach at Taba.

Sometimes a pilgrimage can become quite intense and I think it is necessary to include a bit of fun sightseeing and enjoying the culture and food of the places one visits.

Then there are places like Paris ... in springtime when all the trees lining the Boulevards are in new leaf and Sacre Coeur and Rue de Bac all demand your presence. Riding the Paris Metro, listening to buskers on the train and having to elude Gypsy pickpockets made for an interesting ride.

Lourdes is quite special. Massabielle (the grotto) is a gathering place for prayer and meditation. The nightly candlelit procession in Lourdes is a must. The Rosary is prayed over loudspeakers in different languages and people respond in their mother tongues. This is truly One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church. Here you see it in action.

Flying into Rome one sees the Coliseum and St Peter's from the air. The journey through the Catacombs to St Paul-outside-the-Wall is the history of

the Church through all the good and bad times. Rome is a tourist delight ... if only for the gelato (ice cream).

In 2012 I joined a prayer group on a spiritual journey to Italy and Medjugorje. Accompanied by two priests, even the bus became an Oratory! Visits to Assisi and Giovanni Rotondo had me wishing to spend more time in these serene surroundings. No wonder St Francis and St Padre Pio have become special to me.

En route to Ancona to cross the Adriatic Sea we were privileged to stop at Lanciano where a Eucharistic miracle happened. To see the preserved Heart muscle and the coagulated Blood of Jesus in the precious chalice deepened my faith in the Transubstantiation during the Holy Mass, and this for me was a moment of true joy.

The old Yugoslavia has been divided into several independent states and to get to Medjugorje from Ancona in Italy, one has to cross Croatia, a very beautiful country with a coastline to beat our Garden Route. I could easily have stayed there for many more days but ... the bus ...!

Medjugorje is a small village in the mountains of Bosnia where Our Lady has been appearing for nearly thirty-four years. I was fortunate to be present when the 2 October 2012 vision of Our Blessed Mother to Mirjana Soldo took place.

I have many questions about the happenings in Medjugorje and that is why I am planning to return this September. When the Angelus bell rings out, almost the whole village stops to pray. The people are warm and friendly and welcome strangers into their homes. Unusual for us South Africans! Imagine this ... there are at least forty confessionals around the parish church of St James and each of these stations has long queues of folk WANTING to receive reconciliation. These confessions are heard in many, many languages and Medjugorje has been dubbed "the world's confessional"!

Pilgrimage journeys are a great way to reconnect with your faith. Not always immediately but the impact of visiting and praying in and around holy sites stays embedded in your heart for a long time.

So, what's new? I will most definitely be present at the newest pilgrimage site in South Africa ... that of our own Blessed Benedict Daswa, on 13 September 2015.

One doesn't have to go on all these wondrous and expensive prayerful trips ... we have NGOME in KZN where Our Lady, Tabernacle of the most High, appeared to Sr Reinolda Mei and where several miracles have taken place.

My name is Natasha Odendaal and I am a graduate of Loreto Convent Skinner Street 1987. After finishing high school, I went to Pretoria University and studied Occupational Therapy. After graduation I decided to go overseas to work in the USA in March 1994.

So began my surreal experience in the USA. I had two weeks of orientation, staying at the Days Inn Hotel with my classmates and all of us going to Atlanta from Calhoun, GA to pick up a brand new Nissan Sentra company car – automatic, power everything with cup holders – this is always what comes to mind. There were 7 of us on the trip back – riding on an 8-lane one-way highway because Atlanta was preparing for the 1996 Summer Olympics. After the initial 2 weeks we worked in different parts of the state. Everything was different – the food, fast food – ordering tea from McDonalds and getting cold tea when I was expecting hot tea. To this day I cannot drink cold tea. Deciding what to eat – everything is sweeter here e.g. honey butter, honey mustard sauce, barbeque sauce, Pecan Pie, Pumpkin Pie. The Mexican influence in food, South Western food, traditional southern fried cooking. Most of us picked up weight the first few months but then lost it again after we figured out our new diet. My favourite holiday meal is Thanksgiving – the deep fried Turkey, with all the fixings, as they say, with Pumpkin Pie, Green bean salad, Oven roasted rolls... It is a 4 day weekend truly enjoyed by everyone. Do not forget Black Friday shopping. I have friends that spend Thursday afternoon planning their Friday shopping itinerary.

I ended up becoming a travelling therapist for 6 years. I fulfilled 13-week assignments working in Hospital systems mostly – Outpatient, Acute or Inpatient rehab. I worked in several places in Georgia, Florida, North Carolina, California, Texas and Missouri. I loved the travelling, seeing the country and meeting the people. Have visited 48 of the 50 states.

I was more adventurous because there were times when I would not see a fellow South African for months on end. In a way this was good because it forced me to connect with the local people I came in contact with. Don't get me wrong, I had my sad days when I missed my family and friends but luckily they were few and far between. People in America are friendly, kind, hard working and eager to help especially if working in the rural areas of the states. I love the openness of the smaller cities and subdivisions. No high fences, seeing the front of everybody's yard, leaving your car unlocked in the street and it is still there the next day. I have a fellow classmate who arrived in New

York City and never left New York City – Michelle Stohr from Iona Convent. She on the other hand loves the big cities.

Leaving home and then living on my own forced me to grow up very quickly. Getting your driver's licence when you change states, changing tags on your car (number plates), forwarding mail when you travel. Doing my own laundry, reading a map to get from Florida (Jacksonville) to California (Eureka) in 3 days and start my next work assignment. For my first 2 years of travel there was no cell phone let alone a smart phone. Looking back I realize that it was the grace of God that protected me.

So now, 21 years later I co-own an Independent Private Practice. We offer Speech, Physical and Occupational services to adults and children. I enjoy my life but it is hard work. Most Americans never use up their paid time off every year. Working is fine but living and loving is empowering. My friends and I spend time travelling overseas together (10 days out of the year) at least once a year. My parents joined me in Egypt, Italy, Israel, Jordan and England. In November 2015 I will see them in Cape Town for 1 week. I am bringing 5 friends along from the USA to see the most beautiful city in the world.

America has been very good to me and afforded me opportunities I never thought possible.
