SCHOOL NEWS

"The schoolroom clock was worn raw by stares; and you couldn't look up at the big Puritanical face of it and not feel the countless years of young eyes reflected in it, urging it onwards. It was a dark, old spirit that didn't so much mark time as bequeath it." Tod Wodicka

One can hardly believe that another year has come and gone, and here we stand again, at the threshold of what will surely be another fantastic Loreto Old Girls Reunion. The first inklings of spring have come and gone, and the grand old dame, Pretoria, is once again covered in her purple mantle of Jacaranda. It is time to reflect on the past year, and what it has brought to our School.

Working in a school environment, I have learned, is to be controlled completely by time. Days are measured in periods and breaks (especially breaks!) and months are never just months – they are always terms. Weeks are never just weeks – they are always only so many weeks away from the next holiday. In this environment, it becomes easy to get caught in the monotony of school life – but equally it becomes a safety net of knowing exactly what needs to happen next.

The 2014 year has been a very full one – there have been extreme highs and extreme lows. We have celebrated births and deaths and have laughed and cried together. A new crop of Grade R and 1 learners have eagerly started their long school careers, and another Grade 12 group has left us to embark on a journey of discovery and self-empowerment.

The School had a number of infrastructure upgrades in 2014. New paving was put down in the quad at the end of 2013, which looks most impressive. The building exterior then received a much-needed fresh coat of paint, which looks beautiful. Our tennis courts have been resurfaced and have also been marked for use as netball courts. The renovations were hampered by tree roots and the surfaces were more damaged than we initially expected; however, now that the work is complete, they look fantastic and are ready for many hours of fun in the sun. The school tuck-shop was relocated to a better area outside, in an effort to ease congestion and provide better facilities. The new tuck-shop also has a new manager, serves delicious food and keeps us all in good "show condition"! The school swimming pool is undergoing a major renovation, as it had deteriorated suddenly this season, with many cracks and leaks. School classrooms have been brightened up with new

curtains and pelmets, which has made a big difference to the look in the classrooms. During the June holidays this year, the school's roof had to be repaired and the sheets replaced, as they too had deteriorated, and following the large amounts of rain in 2014, there was water damage to the ceilings and timber. The new roof looks great and should keep everyone dry for years to come. There have been many projects implemented to improve the school building and facility infrastructure over this last year and it is very satisfying to see how serious school Management is taking the renovations and repairs. One must, of course, also thank the current parents who are so diligently paying our building levy and supporting any fundraisers we have at school. Without this extra money it would be almost impossible to do as many upgrades as we have done in this last year.

Our Grade 12 group for 2013 once again achieved very good results in their final Matric Examinations. We achieved another 100% matric pass rate (our 20th consecutive year), as well as achieving the highest Bachelor's pass (university exemption pass) in Pretoria, with just over 97%. Before re-marking, our 72 candidates achieved 86 distinctions. Every subject averaged over 60% and some even as high as 79%. The hard work and dedication of our staff and learners was evident in the results achieved by our Matric class of 2013.

The past year has brought sadness to our school, in the worst ways possible. We were heartbroken at the loss of two learners (Tina-Marie Collison in Grade 5, passed away in September 2013, and Motheo Ntsoane in Grade 10, passed away in May 2014) who were so near to our hearts. A death of a learner at our school is always a very traumatic event for both staff and learners. Both learners' passings were very sudden and unexpected, so they came as a great shock to all. The empty space that these young ladies have left behind is still tangible and we continue to mourn their loss.

As painful as we felt in death, so we also celebrated new life this past year. New babies arrived for Mrs Theron, Mrs Nicholson and Mrs Viljoen. Ms Tsolo, our receptionist, welcomed twins in August, who were born a few weeks early, and arrived as she walked home from school on a Friday afternoon! The babies are doing well, although they were a few weeks premature.

Our Primary and High School learners participated very successfully at the Tshwane Youth Arts Festival, held at the State Theatre in August. Our learners were praised for what was certainly one of the best performances they have delivered thus far. The event is one of our yearly cultural highlights.

Our Matric Dress Fashion Show was graced with the presence of DJ Fresh, much to the delight and amazement of the young ladies. Not used to having a "real and proper" celebrity at school, even the teachers and members of staff were quite star-struck! The event was a great success and the girls looked fantastic. Our Matric Dance in April was a big success too, having moved to a new venue for the first time this year. The food was delicious, and I am told the dancing and partying was quite something – I missed most of it, being as old as I am and my bed calling as loudly as it did! We never recognise the girls, dressed in their finery and made up, as they look so different!

Any school year is filled with the recurring hum-drum of activity that never changes and that fills the spaces between the more unusual occurrences and happenings. Things like Inter-Catholic School events, Inter-House athletics, swimming galas, tree-planting, choir performances and exams continue every year and add to the rich diversity of school life at Loreto Convent School. We do not know what 2015 has in store for us yet, but we do know

that we will face it with courage, fortitude and cheerfulness, in the knowledge that our Lord is with us and keeps us all in the palm of His hand.

From Lukulu, Zambia

20 July 2014

Dear Friends

Recently we had the pleasure of having Elizabeth's sister Jane with us here in Lukulu. Jane was very happy to share her experience and write a 'Letter from Lukulu'. She writes.

"I recently spent three weeks in Zambia and for the most part in Lukulu at the Sancta Maria Mission with Sisters Elizabeth Donnan and Pat Hanvey. Elizabeth often introduced me as Jane, *my blood sister, same father, same mother, I am number one and she is number four and she is a grandmother*, so as not to confuse the local people about my being a member of a religious order. My visit was planned to coincide with a special birthday that Elizabeth celebrated in March this year.

My journey started in Lusaka followed by two days at the Mukambi Safari Lodge on the Kafue River which was great fun. I enjoyed the generous hospitality of the Salesian and Presentation Sisters along the way. We then wended our way along the somewhat treacherous 200 kilometer road to Lukulu (if you can really describe it as a road!).

June was the perfect time to visit Lukulu. The weather was splendid, Nile monitor lizards were absent and mosquitoes were almost non-existent. A trip along the beautiful Zambezi River in a traditional dugout boat at sunset was a highlight.

Whilst in Lukulu, I visited a range of community schools which Elizabeth supports, spent a morning with Sister Pat at the Baby Milk Programme for orphaned and vulnerable infants, met some of the participants of the soap making enterprise, the CTC (Counsel, Test and Care for those living with HIV) and HEPS (High Energy Protein Supplement) programmes. I also had a guided tour of the local hospital and was in awe of the staff who work with very limited resources.

Sunday church services were another highlight with singing by local choirs and dancing aplenty. On the first Sunday I was introduced to the congregation and the choir welcomed me with a song.

I had the pleasure of visiting the residents of the leprosarium who were welcoming and cheerful and giving them some clothing selected by Pat from the 'Old Market'. I was delighted to see them at Mass on the following Sunday decked out in their new finery!

I was invited to the home of a local school teacher where I enjoyed a traditional Zambian meal which included village chicken, game meat and fish dishes and nshima, a type of dough made with ground maize and water and eaten with hands. There was also a range of interesting vegetable dishes such as pumpkin leaves with ground nuts, sweet potato leaves and sindambi, a type of hibiscus leaf that is said to control hypertension. I should also say I appreciated the culinary skills of my hosts during my stay.

At the end of my holiday Elizabeth and I spent three nights at Livingstone and visited the amazing Victoria Falls or as the locals refer to them – Smoke that thunders. We shared a very pleasant meal at the Royal Livingstone Hotel.

All in all, the visit to Zambia was a marvelous and humbling experience. I was privileged to witness the tireless work of Sisters Elizabeth and Pat and to meet the warm and gracious local people.

Obituaries from Pretoria

1. Loreto Sister Oliver O'Mahony was born in 1920 in County Laois in Ireland and died on 31 January 2014 in Pretoria.

Sr Oliver came to South Africa in 1937. She taught maths and music in Loreto schools around the country, including in Strand, Sea Point, Lydenburg, Hillcrest, Skinner Street and Queenswood.

She was the organist in Pretoria's Sacred Heart Cathedral for a number of years.

In retirement she regularly visited the sick and elderly and those who lived alone.

In her 60s she took part in a Renewal Course in Rome. At the age of 80 she went on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land and Egypt with the *Southern Cross*, led by Fr Nicolas King SJ and the future editor of the paper, Gunther Simmermacher. These experiences gave her great life and joy.

In the year 2000 she moved to Holy Cross nursing home in Pretoria where she was involved and shared the community life of those Holy Cross sisters who were also in care.

She died suddenly on 31 January 2014, taking part in the prayers of the Sacrament of the sick. It was exactly three weeks short of her 94th birthday. Many past pupils attended her Requiem Mass. Sr Oliver had spent 77 years in religious life and in South Africa.

She was a pillar of strength for many Loreto pupils over a large number of years and never failed to impress with her calm demeanour, friendly helpfulness and sense of fun. May she rest in peace.

2. With regret, we note the passing on 12 December 2013 of Moira Tothill, born on 03/12/1924, also known as Mother Philomena to some Loreto Old Girls when she taught at Loreto Convent Schools. May she rest in peace.

Now follows Gloria's overview of the MBIDI LODGE CAR SHOW.

The alarm clock went off at 5:15 on Saturday 5 October 2013 and we woke to the birds twittering in the garden heralding the start of a new day. After packing an overnight bag we were on our way to our first rendezvous at The Rose. We greeted friends old and new and soon 7 cars were on their way to Mbidi Lodge (otherside of Loskop Dam) for a car show. Melicia Du Toit in her MGA, Steve Du Toit, accompanied by Jackie (the dog) in his Peugeot 404, Sasha, Mariette and Zani Van Heerden driving Steve's 1958 Studebaker Commander Hardtop Coupe, Abe & Lucille Zelinga in their 1938 Buick Coupe, a 1942 Buick driven by Justus & Charlotte De Waal, Barry & Harriet Groenewald in their 1963 Studebaker Lark and Gordon & Gloria Bouwer with their 1953 Studebaker Starliner Coupe. Anyone who owns an "old" car will know how exciting it is to drive in convoy – cars hooting and flashing lights as they go past, people waving and giving you the thumbs up sign.

On arrival we were greeted by the owner of the Lodge, Willie Fourie, who made us all feel very welcome. In total there were 23 cars on display. All entrants contributed a bottle of wine which was placed in a wheelbarrow and tickets sold for a lucky draw. At 12:00 each car owner drove around the track and said a few words about his vehicle. In total there were 4 Studebakers.

Mbidi Lodge is a wonderful place to visit as they have a breeding programme for the white Bengal Tiger as well as white Lions and Wild Dogs. After dinner that evening, as we all sat on the verandah, overlooking the pool and entertainment area, we were spoilt with a visit from some of their animals. The first to visit us was Saber, a 9 week old White Bengal Tiger cub, there are only between 40 and 50 left on earth in captivity, none in the wild. He is not an Albino as he has ice blue eyes, it is just an absence of the orange gene. He was followed by Kubu, who is a Golden Tiger, or a split gene. One parent was a normal Bengal and the other a white Bengal. There are only about 30 Golden Tigers left in the world. Kubu is 18 months old and weighs just over 100kg. Hopefully when Saber is older they will be able to

breed the white tiger and increase the white tiger population. When standing on his back legs he was already taller than John, his handler.

We then had a visit from Romeo, their tame Cheetah who is 3 years old and one of the third most endangered species in South Africa, only between 500 and 1000 left in South Africa, worldwide there are between 9000 and 12000 left. They are the fastest animals on earth reaching 70km/h in 2 seconds. Romeo has now been joined by Juliet who is 11 months old, also hand reared. At the neighbouring Dikwena Lodge, which like Mbidi falls under the Ramela Ranch, there is a chapel, often used for weddings. On request Romeo wears a special bow tie and carries the rings into the Church. Cheetahs are the only big cat that can purr, but they cannot roar.

They also have the white and tawny lions. White lions are bigger than the tawny ones as they are not easily camouflaged and have to be bigger and stronger to overpower other predators and to protect their females from other males. The first white lion was found in the Timbavati Nature Reserve near Kruger National Park. There are about 1000 white lions left in captivity, none in the wild that they know of.

Thank you to John and Nicolene for showing us the animals up close and allowing us to touch, hug and have our photographs taken with the animals. Many thanks, too, to Willie and Santa Fourie and all their assistants for a wonderful weekend.
