Sad news to report – my aunt, Lola (Brink) Neethling (she was Headgirl, I think round about 1950) passed away peacefully in her sleep on Sunday, 14 September 2021. She was residing at the Mothwa Haven in Garsfontein. Her sister, Winifred Snyman (Brink) is still there; and my mom, Monica Hazell, is at Sonnheim Retirement Centre in the frail care unit in Arcadia.

Sadly, my mom, Monica, passed away in Queenstown at 23:45 on Saturday, 30 July 2022. She was 87.

Mom celebrated her 87th birthday at Sonnheim in Arcadia, Pretoria (I was there to celebrate with her), but on the same day I was advised that the home was closing down.

As neither my brother, nor I reside in Pretoria or even remotely close to Pretoria these days, we moved mom to Madeira Old Age Home in Queenstown (now known as Komani) on 8 July. (Her Dr declared her fit enough to travel the distance). Mom stayed with us overnight and on 9 July we moved her into the home.

Understandably, she wasn't very happy about having to move and wanted her friends, but there wasn't really anything else we could do. From the first Tuesday there, she was happier and loved her carer, Noni. Our Dr, who gave Mom the once-over, advised that her lungs were shot (from all the years of smoking), her bones were finished (from the osteoporosis), but that her heart was as strong as anything. He also mentioned that a move like this for someone so advanced in age, is like a death in the family to them, so kudos to Monica for settling in so quickly.

On the Wednesday before Mom died, she presumably cracked a rib (from coughing) and she was in quite a lot of pain and was unable to walk very much and was mainly confined to lying down. She became semi-comatose on the Saturday morning and her condition worsened during the night.

There are quite a few Catholics at the home, and she was due to join them for a prayer meeting the following week. One of the residents (a 92 year old) was so sweet and had the foresight to phone our priest who arrived at about 4pm and he gave Mom the last rites (and one of the sisters had hung her rosary around her neck as well).

The priest did tell me a funny anecdote: This said 92 year old lady asked mom if she could come and pray with her, so mom said no thanks, I am Catholic. The lady then advised that she was also Catholic and they would say Catholic prayers. Only then, did Mom relent and

say they could pray together.

I remember telling you that Lola Neethling (Dolores Brink) had passed away at the end of September last year. She was 88 years old. (Her youngest son, predeceased her on 28 June at the age of 52) and her husband died 20 years ago. Her eldest son, Noel, will scatter both his late brother's and his mother's ashes here in SA.

Winnie Snyman (Winifred Brink) is 85 and is still at Mothwa Haven in Garsfontein. She is generally in good health and in good spirits.

14. Father Mike Van Heerden (Strand Loreto Old Boy) from Durbanville Cape Town gives upliftment:

Dear Friends in Christ,

St Bernard of Clairvaux, one of the greatest saints of the middle ages, was born in 1090 and grew up in Dijon, France. At the age of 23, he entered the Cistercian monastery of Citeaux near Dijon. Three years later he was appointed to supervise a group of his fellow monks in the newly founded monastery at Clairvaux. Though he was often offered high positions in the church during his life as a monk, Bernard rather remained at Clairvaux until his death in 1153. He became renowned throughout the world for his spiritual writings and homilies. In one of his most famous books - entitled: *On the Love of God*, St Bernard reflects on what he calls the four degrees of love. When we look at this Sunday's scripture readings there seems to be very different themes. However, on deeper reflection we can see that these four degrees of love are a central theme of the three readings taken together.

The first degree of Love: Love of self for self's sake

When we think of when we were born – we have a natural love for ourselves. So much so that at first, we see ourselves as the centre of the whole universe. When a child cries for its feed – it has no concern who it wakes up or disrupts. Babies love themselves for their own sake – but, as we grow up we realise that in order to survive in our social world we have to also look out for others. Social living takes reciprocity. We care for others - so that they can care for us. Our love for others at this stage is really a form of self-love.

The second degree of Love: Love of God for self's sake

As we mature, however, in this social love, God begins to reveal His love to us – enticing us into a relationship with Him. God begins to show us that in order to really care for our lives we need to care for Him. When we reach some kind of challenge, for example, some storm that we cannot cope with alone - such as the disciples encountered in today's Gospel – it awakens the sense of God within us and we are inspired to appeal for His protection and care. As the Gospel says: "And they were filled with awe and said to one another: "Who then is

this – that even wind and sea obey him?" (Mark 4: 41)." God also uses positive incidences in our lives to fill us with His consolations and the presence of His gifts. We begin to love God - even though it is also an extension of our self–love. We love God for our own self-sake. We love God because we have learnt that we can do all things through Him and we are better people when united with God.

One teacher in the little town of Robertson, Western Cape, every year would ask her class to draw a picture of something they were thankful for so as to have the right frame of mind to celebrate national youth day on the 16th June - Sharpeville Day. She would often think quietly to herself how little these children from poor neighbourhoods had to be thankful for – but she knew most would draw pictures of playing in the veld or Sunday dinner with the family around. The teacher was taken aback with the picture that Jannie handed in – it was a simple roughly drawn hand. But whose hand was it? The children were captivated – was it the hand of his mother who brought him food or the hand of his friends that he played with. "No," said Jannie, "it is the teacher's hand – she waited there at the gate on my first day of school and she had extended her hand and led me into the new and free world of knowledge. How can one repay those who give us courage and help us to face the challenges of this world?" It is God leads us by the hand at this stage of our Christian growth. But, there is a danger here that we begin to love the gifts more than the Giver of these gifts.

The third degree of love: Love of God for God's sake

Many people lose heart and give up their relationship with God when the gifts and consolations become less frequent or are lost altogether for a while. They feel that God has abandoned them – rather than the fact that God draws back a little so that their love can be tested and purified. In today's first reading, we meet the figure of Job. Job was blessed by God with everything one could expect from life: health, happiness, a loving family and plenty of money. But, Job had begun to love these gifts more than the Giver of the gifts. It was only when he lost everything that Job could realize the greatness of God the Creator. Only then could he come to love the Giver more than the gifts. Job realized that the ways of God the creator could never be fully understood by our limited minds – but what God has revealed to us in creation and in His Word more than adequately shows His love for us. In the first reading, God says to Job that it was God Himself who drew the boundaries of the oceans and who put the patterns of weather in place. To this day we do not fully comprehend these patterns – but we do understand that there is a Cosmic Soul or Mind behind them.

As our love grows for God – not for our sake, but for God's sake – our whole world view begins to change. We begin to see things through the Mind of Christ. St Paul in our second reading today says that while he once regarded Christ from a human point of view – he no longer does. After his conversion Paul realised the way Christ sees us: not through the eyes of selfish human love – but through the eyes of God's selfless, infinite love. He was the one who asked Paul:"Why are you persecuting me?" Christ loves His Body the Church and it is this "love of Christ that urges us on" – Paul tells us in this second reading (2 Cor 5:14). If Christ loves His Church as His Body -that means that He loves each one us in the same infinite measure.

The fourth degree of love: Love of self for God's sake

There is a true story told about King George VI of England – well known in our time because of the film: *The King's Speech*. He was travelling up north in the Royal Train to visit the

people of Manchester. As the train arrived at the station, all the celebrities were gathered to greet the King as well as children from all the schools. These sang the national anthem as the King moved through the crowd - greeting people as he went. After the king had left the teachers gathered together their children to return to school. One teacher found a girl from her class in floods of tears. She said to her: "Jane, what is the matter – did you not see the king?" "Yes, Miss," she replied: "but the King did not see me!"

The final stage of love is realising that God sees each person in their uniqueness and loves them infinitely. It is the love of God that sustains all things in being – without that love everything would fall into nothingness. In this final stage of love we realise, as St Paul says in the second reading today, that: ". . . if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation, the old has passed away – behold, the new has come"(2 Cor 5: 17). We can love ourselves because God loves us and His love makes us loveable. We can love our neighbour as we love ourselves knowing that the love of God extends to all people. As St Augustine once said: "Because You have loved me, O Lord – You have made me loveable." In the love of God let each one of us strive to see the world with these new eyes.

Oh, the love of my Lord is the essence Of all that I love here on earth All the beauty I see He has given to me And His giving is gentle as silence.

Felicity has also sent us the following in relation to her own school days.



YOGA

The asanas or postures are what most people are familiar with which have many benefits such as keeping the body supple and healthy, helping to calm the mind and minimize stress – physically and mentally. It has been known to assist with alleviating back problems, high blood pressure, aching joints and much more.

However, in addition to this, yoga is a vast system of self-development that we can practise in our daily lives. It is a complimentary training in body, mind, thought, speech, and actions - with full awareness and can become a part of our nature and through it we can change who we are and return to our higher nature.

The word yoga is derived from the root word *yuj*, meaning 'to bind together' or 'to yoke'. It has also been said that the term yoga could be derived from the root *yuja* in the sense of 'concentration'. Yoga has also been known as *'samatva'*, which literally means 'sameness' or 'evenness' and *'samatva'* has all kinds of overtones, including 'balance' and 'harmony'.

Another definition of yoga is 'to unite'. The practitioner is striving for union with God or that transcendental power called the Divine.

The practice of yoga raises the level of our awareness. This is a process - to become conscious of our more subtle selves, to awaken to the realization that we are integrated - not separate from Divinity. Yoga is about integrating the diversity of body, mind and spirit.

Yoga is about firsthand experience. It is about exploration inwards to the very depths of your own being, a path of self- discovery and this exploration brings about an expanding awareness and knowledge of the processes of life.

Yoga enables us to unite with the real and separate from the unreal. We need to understand this definition through our practice to realize the self and to experience the ultimate aim of yoga - to merge with the Divine. In order to do this yoga provides a system that allows us to work on all aspects of our personality: to bring us from the gross and mundane and take us to the subtle and the Divine.
